THE IMPORTANCE OF RELICS

The Importance of Relics

A relic is a part of the physical remains of a saint after their death, such as a fragment of bone or hair, or an object that has been in contact with their body. In the Catholic tradition, relics are not objects of worship but are venerated as a way of honoring the holiness of God, made manifest through the lives of His saints.

Why Are St. Bernadette's Relics Journeying to Us?



Pilgrimage is a profound spiritual practice, allowing us to step outside our daily routines and draw closer to God. Conscious that many who have a love of Lourdes and devotion to St. Bernadette the relics of St. Bernadette are being brought to Ireland during September and October 2024. This visit allows individuals and communities to experience the spiritual richness of pilgrimage in their own churches, offering opportunities for healing, conversion, and even the discovery of one's vocation.

Why Are Relics Important to Catholics?

The veneration of relics is not unique to Catholicism; it reflects the universal human instinct to care for and honour the remains of those we love. In the Christian tradition, relics have been revered from the earliest centuries. The relics of saints, such as St. Polycarp, were described as being "more valuable than precious stones and finer than refined gold."

From the time of the early Church, relics—especially those of martyrs—were held in special veneration. Christians would gather for prayer services in the catacombs of Rome, and by the fourth century, the Eucharist was celebrated over the tombs of the martyrs. As St. Augustine explained, the bodies of saints and martyrs are precious because they were temples of the Holy Spirit during their earthly lives.

There are two principal reasons why Catholics venerate relics:

1. God's Grace Through Relics: Throughout history, God has shown His approval of relics by granting healing and other graces to those who venerate them with faith. Relics serve as channels of God's mercy and power.
2. Connection to Holiness: Relics help us feel closer to the holy person they belong to, making the communion of saints more real and present in our lives. They inspire us to seek holiness in our own lives, reminding us that we, too, are called to live as instruments of the Holy Spirit.

St. Bernadette's Legacy and Lourdes

St. Bernadette Soubirous, to whom the Virgin Mary appeared in Lourdes, has become a beacon of hope and healing for millions of pilgrims. Her life of humility, suffering, and deep trust in God continues to inspire people around the world. The relics of St. Bernadette make this spiritual connection with her even more tangible, inviting us to experience the same grace that has flowed through Lourdes for generations.

Preparation:

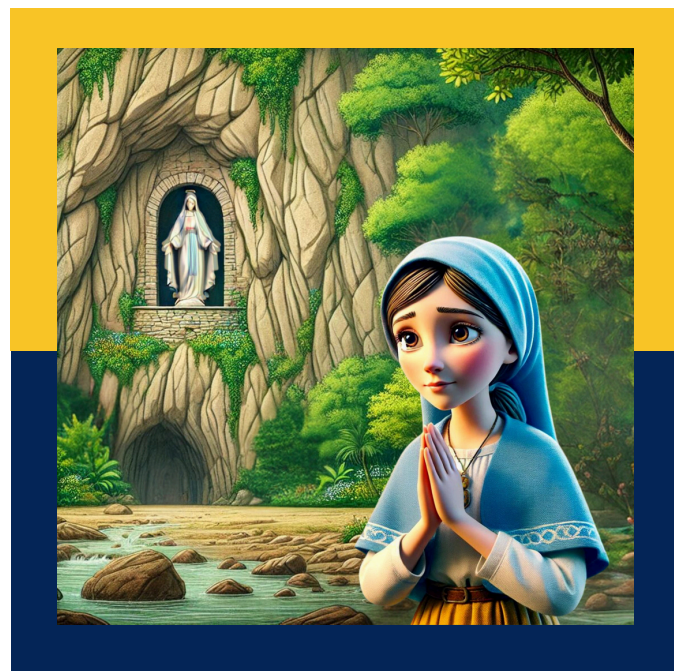
Read through Saint Bernadette's biography and key stories to familiarise yourself with her life and significance.

Biography Summary:

Saint Bernadette Soubirous, was born on January 7, 1844, in Lourdes, France. She was the eldest daughter in a poor miller's family and despite her fragile health and frequent illnesses, Saint Bernadette is best known for experiencing 18 apparitions of the Virgin Mary in 1858 at the Grotto of Massabielle, near Lourdes.

During these apparitions, a "young lady" who later identified herself as the "Immaculate Conception," instructed Bernadette to dig in the ground, revealing a spring of water. This spring, known as Lourdes water, is believed to have miraculous healing properties and has attracted millions of pilgrims worldwide.

Despite scepticism from many and following an extensive investigation, the Catholic Church declared Bernadette's visions as worthy of belief in 1862. Bernadette later joined the Sisters of Charity in Nevers, France, where she lived a humble and holy life, working in the infirmary until her death at the age of 35 on April 16, 1879. She was made a saint in 1933.

Key Miracles

- The First Apparition: On February 11, 1858, while gathering firewood with her sister and a friend, Bernadette saw a vision of a young lady in white at the Grotto of Massabielle, which was then the rubbish dump for the town. This marked the first of 18 apparitions, during which the Lady revealed herself as the Immaculate Conception.
- The Healing Spring: During one of the apparitions, Bernadette was instructed to dig in the ground, where she uncovered a spring. The water from this spring became known for its miraculous healing properties, leading to numerous cures.
- The Candle Incident: During one of her visions, Bernadette held her hand over a burning candle for an extended period without suffering any burns, a phenomenon witnessed by many onlookers and considered miraculous.



Reflections and Activities

Discussion Questions:

- What do you think St. Bernadette felt when she first saw Our Lady? How would you react in her situation?
- What does the story of the healing spring teach us about faith and trust in God?
- How can Bernadette's humility and obedience inspire us in our own lives?

Craft Activity:

Create a "Lourdes Grotto" model using simple materials like cardboard, clay or papier mâché. Children can shape the grotto, add a statue of the Virgin Mary, and place a small spring or well to represent the miraculous water. They can also paint or colour the grotto.

Service Project:

Encourage children to practice acts of kindness and humility, such as visiting the sick or helping those in need, reflecting St. Bernadette's service to others despite her own hardships.

Hail Mary

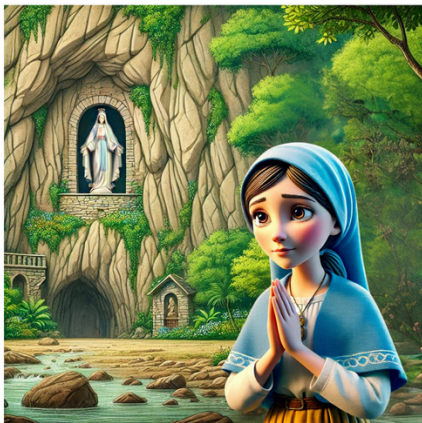
Hail Mary full of grace.

The Message of Lourdes

St. Bernadette's Life - A Journey of Love and Faith

18th February 1858: Extraordinary Words

- Mary spoke for the first time to Bernadette, saying, "What I have to say to you does not have to be written down."
- Mary's message was one of deep, personal connection—heart to heart. From the very beginning, Mary invited Bernadette to receive a message of love.

A Special Invitation

- Mary then asked, "Would you be so kind as to come here for fifteen days?"
- For Bernadette, this respectful and loving request made her feel valued as a person. This message for all of us: We are all loved and respected by God.

Promises for the Next World

- Mary said, "I do not promise to make you happy in this world but in the other."
- While life can be hard, God's love is with us, and true happiness awaits us in heaven.

The Power of Love

- Despite her hardships and humble beginnings, Bernadette radiated happiness. Born into poverty, she struggled with chronic illness throughout her life, yet her faith remained strong.
- Acceptance of Suffering: Bernadette embraced her suffering, seeing herself as a simple tool of God, offering her pain for the greater good.
- Despite her hardships, Bernadette found strength in God's love, transforming her suffering into a path toward holiness.

A Hidden Treasure: The Spring

- In the ninth apparition, Mary revealed a spring, symbolising the healing love of Jesus. Her call to "penance" means turning our hearts to God.

A Name Revealed: The Immaculate Conception

- On 25th March 1858, Mary told Bernadette, "I am the Immaculate Conception," affirming Mary's role as the Mother of God and affirming her purity.

Reflection Activities

Video Activity:

NOVENA TO ST. BERNADETTE



Introduction to the Novena to St. Bernadette



This novena is designed to be reflective in nature and can be prayed individually or communally. Whether used in liturgical settings, parish gatherings, or with family members, the prayers and reflections offer a pathway to deepen our trust in God, find hope amidst suffering, and embrace the healing that Christ offers through His saints.

Through St. Bernadette's example, may we open our hearts to the grace and blessings that flow from God, trusting in His mercy and compassion.

The novena can be used as individual, group or communal preparation in advance of your visit to the relic of St. Bernadette in the cathedral of St. Colman and St. Patrick, Newry, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh or St. Patrick's Church Dundalk.



Introductory Prayer

Dear Saint Bernadette,

Chosen by God as a channel of His graces and blessings, and through your humble obedience to the requests of our Blessed Mother, Mary, you gained for us the miraculous waters of spiritual and physical healing.

We implore you to listen to our prayers, that we may be healed of our imperfections.

Place our petitions in the hands of our Holy Mother, Mary, so that she may place them at the feet of her beloved Son, Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, that He may look on us with mercy and compassion: (*mention request here...*)

Help us, dear Saint Bernadette, to follow your example, so that irrespective of our own pain and suffering we may always be mindful of the needs of others, especially those whose sufferings are greater than ours.

As we await the mercy of God, remind us to offer up our pain and suffering for the conversion of sinners, and in reparation for the sins and blasphemies of mankind.

Pray for us, St Bernadette, that like you, we may always be obedient to the will of our Heavenly Father, and that through our prayers and humility we may bring consolation to the most Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary that have been so grievously wounded by our sins.

Saint Bernadette of Lourdes, Pray for us.

Amen.

9 Day Novena Reflections

Day 1: Trust in God's Will

Theme: Trust in God's will, even when life seems overwhelming.

Reflection: St. Bernadette accepted her path in life, despite her suffering from poverty and ill health. Her humble beginnings and constant trust in God's will guided her through difficult times.

Reflection Questions:

- How can we trust God in moments of difficulty?
- What areas of your life do you find it hard to trust God in?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 2: Hope Amidst Suffering

Theme: Hope that God can bring light into moments of suffering.

Reflection: St. Bernadette persevered despite continuous illness and social rejection. She found hope in her relationship with God and through the apparitions of Our Lady, who provided her with strength.

Reflection Questions:

- When have you experienced suffering?
- How has God been present for you in those moments?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 3: Devotion to the Eucharist

Theme: Drawing strength from the Eucharist in difficult times.

Reflection: St. Bernadette had a deep love for the Eucharist. Even though she found her catechism classes difficult, she persevered and prepared herself wholeheartedly for her first Holy Communion, recognizing the grace that flows from Christ in the Eucharist.

Reflection Questions:

- How does the Eucharist nourish your soul?
- In what ways can you turn to Christ in the Eucharist for healing?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

9 Day Novena Reflections

Day 4: Devotion to Mary

Theme: Seeking Our Lady's intercession in moments of need.

Reflection: Even before her apparitions, St. Bernadette had a special devotion to the Rosary. She saw herself as a child of Mary and trusted in her maternal guidance throughout her life.

Reflection Questions:

- How can Mary's example guide you in your life?
- When have you experienced Mary's maternal care?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 5: Facing Doubt and Disbelief

Theme: Remaining faithful in the face of doubt or disbelief.

Reflection: St. Bernadette faced ridicule and disbelief from her own family and townspeople when she shared her visions. Despite these challenges, she remained calm and trusted in God's plan.

Reflection Questions:

- How do you react when others doubt your faith?
- In what ways can you strengthen your faith when faced with disbelief?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 6: Offering Up Suffering for Others

Theme: Offering your own struggles for the good of others.

Reflection: St. Bernadette understood the value of offering her suffering for the conversion of sinners, embracing her illness as part of her spiritual mission.

Reflection Questions:

- How can you offer your own pain and suffering for the conversion of others?
- What challenges in your life can you unite with Christ's suffering?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

9 Day Novena Reflections

Day 7: Obedience to God's Will

Theme: Obeying God's will, even when it seems strange or difficult.

Reflection: St. Bernadette's obedience to Mary's requests, even when misunderstood by others, led to the creation of a healing spring that continues to bring grace to pilgrims today.

Reflection Questions:

- When have you been called to do something difficult for God?
- How can you cultivate a spirit of obedience to God's will?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 8: Speaking the Truth

Theme: Courage in speaking the truth, even under pressure.

Reflection: Even when interrogated by church officials and others about her visions, St. Bernadette remained firm in her recounting of the truth, always keeping her answers simple and faithful.

Reflection Questions:

- How do you stay true to your faith when questioned?
- In what ways can you share the truth of your faith with others?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Day 9: Humility

Theme: Embracing humility in all things.

Reflection: St. Bernadette's life was marked by profound humility. Even after the apparitions brought her fame, she referred to herself as a simple servant of God, always pointing to His glory rather than her own.

Reflection Questions:

- How can you cultivate humility in your daily life?
- In what ways can you follow St. Bernadette's example of humble service?

Concluding Prayer: Decade of the Rosary + Memorare.

Concluding Prayer

After quiet meditation on the theme and reflection for the day. You are asked to consider and further reflect on the questions provided in this novena guide.

When you have concluded your period of reflection you are asked to:

- Pray one decade of the Rosary.
- Pray the Memorare

Memorare:

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary,
That never was it known that anyone who fled to thy
protection, implored thy help, or sought thine intercession
was left unaided.

Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins,
my mother; to thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and
sorrowful.

O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions,
but in thy mercy hear and answer me.

Amen.

O Mary conceived without sin,
pray for us who have recourse to Thee.

(Repeat three times)
